## From The Prez

**D**URING OUR GENERAL MEETING in May, the members approved the board's recommendation to apply for tax-exempt status under the auspices of the American Iris Society. The most significant element of the application is a revision of the MBIS bylaws.

The board recommended that we retain the current bylaws without essential changes, and add sections from the model bylaws presented by the AIS's pro bono attorney, Bob Plank. These additions bring our bylaws into compliance with regulations for tax-exempt organizations.

The board subsequently recommended modifying the current provision that limits officers of the MBIS to four consecutive one-year terms. The Show Chairman position is already exempted from this limit. The Board recommended also exempting the Editor position from this limit. The four-year term limit still applies to the other officer positions: President, Vice-president, Treasurer and Secretary. I have sent our draft application for tax-exempt status to Attorney Bob Plank for his review and comment. I will make any final changes that may be necessary and file our application by the deadline date of June 15, 2007.

I also asked Attorney Plank if our proposed new tax-exempt status would limit the traditional use of MBIS funds to subsidize Christmas dinners for our members.

The draft application will be on our website, montereybayiris.org, for reference. Our bylaws include a clear process for revising the bylaws, so at any time the MBIS can make additional revisions that may be desired.

Finally, please see Diane Sampson's message elsewhere in this issue of Bay News, inviting members to participate in the MBIS booth at the Smart Gardening Faire. The event will be on Saturday, June 23, 2007. Members can participate by providing irises for sale at the booth and helping at the booth for a couple of hours during the day. The rewards for spending time in the MBIS booth include the opportunity to visit other booths at the Faire and hear talks by highly qualified experts on sustainable gardening and landscaping. ## CULTURE TIPS

**W**E JUST FINISHED a really fine bloom season. Weather was just perfect for superior bloom and growth. This was the best bloom on our roses in 57 years of growing them. Visited Oregon and the weather was perfect (compared to last year) and the bloom was the best I have seen it there. No one can match what Keith Keppel has in his seedling beds. His discards are better than most of the introductions you find on the market. Made my usual pollen dapping in his garden to suplement the cross I made at home

This year the growth on the irises is fantastic. Huge rhizomes bristling with increase. (pity the poor commercial grower who has to ship them with the new jump in postal rates!). It has been days of June Gloom which means your irises need little or no watering. Remember to cut off all watering at least two weeks before you plan to dig them. Our irises will receive no water this year.

Cut or snap out the spent bloom stalks; dig any weeds; and check your labels. Diseases and pests don't seem to be much of a problem this year. This fact is probably due to the cold winter we finally had. If you have any baby seedlings; replant them promptly to increase your chances of them blooming next spring. ❁❁ Joe



# 2ND ANNUAL SMART GARDENING FAIRE

## A SPECIAL EVENT FOR HOME GARDENERS

The Monterey Bay Master Gardens, in conjunction with the Parade of Ponds, will present the second annual Smart Gardening Faire at Skypark in Scotts Valley on Saturday, June 23, 2007 from 9 A.M. until 4 P.M.. This free event for home gardeners will present up-to-date knowledge about horticulture, water conservation, sustainable gardening and landscaping for novice and experienced gardeners.

The events of the day will include talks by strongly qualified speakers and demonstrations by local gardening and landscaping groups plus a marketplace of plants and garden related items. The day will be rounded out with children's activities, live music and food booths.

### Speakers Tent

In a new feature of the Faire for this year, several local garden societies will give brief presentations, often with demonstrations, on their gardening area of particular interest. We will announce individual speakers and topics as the schedule is confirmed.

### Exhibitors

We are expecting up to fifty exhibitors for the 2007 Faire. The exhibitors represent local gardening groups, ecologically minded landscapers, recyclers, and more. ### Marketplace

Nurseries ranging from FezQ in Carmel Valley to Crescent Hill Nursery, Astone's Protea to Surf City Growers and Terra Sole Nurseries will have booths. Both individual artists and a group of artistic Master Gardeners will offer garden-related art for purchase.

### Demonstrations

Attendees can learn to build a professional-grade waterfall and pond, in a major demonstration by professional pond builders from Brookside Water Garden Center from 9 AM to 12 Noon. This demonstration at the Smart gardening Faire will be the first stop in this year's Parade of Ponds.

Additional demonstrations—many of which will be hands-on—include the following: tool sharpening, plant propagation and composting. Experts will answer questions on plant problems.

### Children

The Life Lab Science Program will present a full day of garden-oriented activities for children, making the Smart Gardening Faire a family event. Life Lab activities are being partially sponsored by the Valley Women's Club.

### Music

The Cabrillo College Farmers Market String Band will play during the day to add to the festivities.
