CULTURE TIPS

WE'VE HAD A VERY DRY DECEMBER after some very wet storms in October. Only remember one other year when it was this dry and warm in December. The upside is that I was able to get on my knees and clean up the irises without getting all dirty and muddy. As of now the irises look good. There has been some cold evenings that "burned back" leaves and froze any bloom-stalks. This is a good thing. Irises and lots of plants perform better come spring with a good winter chilling. Hopefully this happens this year especially since we are hosting the Spring Region 14 Convention this year.

The things to be sure to get done this month is clean our dead leaves and cut back diseased and brown tipped leaves. Get those weeks out before the rains return and turn the soil to goopy mess. Cleaning up your beds will have the irises ready for the most important fertilization for your irises: the application of a balanced fertilizer, like 10-10-10, triple 12, etc., in early February as the new growth begins. Yes, new growth is only about a month away!

If significant rains don't happen and you have loose, sandy soil, consider giving your irises some water. Also if you find aphids hiding in the folds of your leaves, an application of a system insecticide will solve the problem quickly. Also if you dormant spray your fruit trees and roses, do your irises at the same time. It helps control the fungus spores overwintering. ❁❁ Joe

Sunday, February 5, 10 am to 1 pm at the Louise Cain Gatehouse, UCSC Farm. This workshop is tailored to gardeners with small plots or raised beds. Treasures of Henry Cowell SP

Join Deanna Giuliano to visit one of our local treasures: Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park. We will see our local endemic *Arctostaphylos silvicola* and *Ribes divaricatum* in its special habitat of the sandhills, and then meander through some of the controlled burn area to discover what is sprouting, on our way to the observation deck for a stunning view of Santa Cruz and the Monterey Bay. Our loop back will take us up Eagle creek where we will see some special plants. Hike is moderately strenuous (deep sand!) and about 4.5 to 5 miles round trip.

Trip is from 10 am to 2 pm, on Sunday January 29. Bring water, layers, sunscreen, hat and a lunch. Meet at Juvenile Hall parking lot off Graham Hill Road. 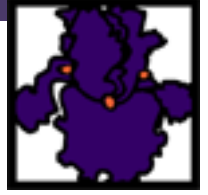
